Brokenness and Expectation

Dear Parents and Students,

Eleven years ago I found myself sitting down over a walking bridge outside a mosque in the Middle-East. I had just left having a conversation with a Muslim who had tried to persuade me that 9/11 never happened and that Jesus is not Lord. As a follower of Christ, I was overwhelmed by the sense of hopelessness with this conversation, knowing that it was not the exception but the norm of the cultural context. I often find myself pondering little moments like this, moments of feeling broken to the point of tears for the lost in our world. My prayer is that our students would find themselves broken this summer.

Although our summer mission trips look exactly the same as 2023, we know that each day God is doing a new work in this world and in our lives (Isaiah 43:19). Is God at work in the monotony of life with a 9-5pm work life? Yes and how much more-so as we meet new people to love and share the gospel with? Gen Z has high expectations for the lives they want to live and even higher expectations of what God can do in them and through them. My prayer is that our students would find themselves raising their expectations on God even higher!

Between brokenness and expectation, our one goal for Student Missions in 2024 is to allow God to break through our expectations! Every leader on these trips will be expected to push students through mediocrity, raising the bar of what God will do, and allow inward brokenness to be renewed by the gospel. As the Holy Spirit is at work pursuing 8 billion souls, we want to participate in the work that is already being done in God's kingdom!

As you review the following application, please pray through what trip God is calling you to, not based upon familiarity or comfortability, but upon what will break you the most while raising your expectation of what Jesus can do. As a shepherd, I will be challenging each student individually to see why they chose what they chose. Finally, please note two changes: At our January 7 parent/student meeting, we will be announcing a drastic change to Student Missions in 2025. Secondly, we will be having an end of the summer celebration for both students and parents! Come hungry and excited to celebrate Jesus' faithfulness!

LEADERTREKS - Memphis, TN Open to students in grades 8-12 June 30-July 6, 2024

APPLICATION PROCESS

(KEEP FOR YOUR RECORDS)

Getting Started:

- Pray, pray, pray about your decision of serving the Lord through Student Missions. Ask others to pray for you as well! Pray for guidance as you seek wisdom in which teams to apply for.
- Read the project description sheet to learn more about each team and what type of ministry we will be doing.
- Thoroughly read through the Student Commitment sheet. Decide if you can commit to each of these. If you can't right now, consider any adjustments you may need to make so you can fulfill them.

Before Saturday, January 7:

- Complete the Student Missions Application and have your parents complete the parent reference form. Give yourself plenty of time to complete the entire application by the deadline.
- Turn in your completed forms at student ministry or the office by January 7! All students must turn in the following items to apply for a short term mission project:
 - Student Missions Application (Section A-C)
 - Signed Student Commitment Form (Section D)
 - Parent Reference Form (Section E)

Important Information and Dates (Mark these on your calendar!):

It's extremely important that you attend all meetings!

• At the January 13 meeting we will send hand out letters of acceptance and inform students which team they will be serving on this summer.

FINANCIAL INFO AND KEY QUESTIONS

Every year it is exciting to see how God provides for the financial needs of each student & team. It is important that each student plays an active role in helping us raise the necessary funds & building a large network of prayer warriors & financial supporters.

Here is the part you will need to play:

- ⇒ Giving your own financial contribution
- ⇒ Sending out support letters— this is such a great opportunity for others to partner with us in supporting the ministry that will take place this summer

Personal Contribution: \$100 (Due on 1/13/24)

Minimum # of support letters to mail out: 20 (Due on 3/15/24)

Financial goal of support to be raised by letters: \$325

Questions & Answers:

1. What if my family chooses to not send support letters?

While we strongly encourage students to send out support letters, we understand there may be circumstances that lead a family to decide not to send out these support letters. In these cases, we ask the students to take the following steps:

- In place of support letters, students should send out a modified prayer letter (send out as a letter or email).
- Give an additional contribution in place of support letters (see the box above). The amount required is the support letter's goal listed for each team. These amounts should be given by April 10.

2. What if I do not meet my support letter financial goal?

Periodically we will have a student fall short of the support letter financial goal (see the box above). In these cases, there are some additional steps we will ask the student to take. Spencer Smith and your student mission team leaders will help guide the students through this.

- Follow up with the people you sent support letters. This can come in the form of a phone call, text, email, or
 Facebook note. Ask them if they received your support letter and if they have any questions about what
 you will be doing this summer. Don't pressure them to give financially, but sometimes people do need a
 helpful reminder and if they ask, you can express your need for additional supporters.
- Send out additional support letters. Prayerfully consider others you didn't send out letters to initially.
- Find other ways to raise money and give this towards your youth missions support raising. There are tons of options here: babysitting, doing odd jobs, etc.
- Consider making an additional personal contribution.

3. What if I can not attend the Student Missions Service Day?

Participation at the Service Day is crucial; so we ask students to put a high priority on this event! If a student has a conflict during a portion of the day, it is helpful to have them still come for whatever time they can attend. In the case of a complete conflict with the service day, students will be required to make up this experience. This should be communicated well in advance with Spencer Smith or Meg Fitzpatrick and they will help make arrangements.

4. What if I am unable to serve at the Student Missions Fundraiser?

The Student Mission Fundraiser is HUGE, so it is extremely important that everyone participates in this event. If a student has a significant conflict the day of the fundraiser, they must notify Spencer Smith or Meg Fitzpatrick of this well in advance. In place of the roughly 6 hours of serving that day, we will expect the student to fulfill those 6 hours by helping with the preparations leading up to the Youth Missions Fundraiser.


